What is the Northwest Food Hub Network?

The Northwest Food Hub Network is a collective of farmer-owned cooperative food hubs representing 250+ local food producers across Washington and Montana. We share inventory, services, and infrastructure to offer a sustainable sourcing alternative for communities.



What is a food hub?

Food hubs aggregate, market, and distribute local food to create **economic opportunity** for producers and **expand access** to fresh, healthy food for communities.

What makes our food hubs unique?

We are a network of **farmer-owned cooperatives.** Our most important decisions—what we source, the price we pay our farms, and who we do business with—are made **democratically** by our producers. Unlike for-profit food hubs and distributors that extract value to pay outside shareholders, profits are **shared** by our farmers and **reinvested** to sustain their cooperatives.

What is the purpose of the Network?

Community-based institutions like K-12 schools, hospitals, and universities represent the largest share of the wholesale food market. Because their purchasing needs dictate a volume and variety of goods that exceeds the scale of a single food hub—let alone a single farm—they traditionally turn to broadline food distributors that source from far-away commercial farms.

We upend this unsustainable status quo and offer a **better alternative**. By bringing together our region's producers to share supply and infrastructure, we provide a **socially responsible** path to sourcing local food at scale—that means delivering fresh, healthy food to communities, minimizing food miles, and empowering producers through **economies of collaboration**.
